- This vaccine is an injection that goes into your arm.
- People in New Zealand can get this vaccine from special clinics that might be set up at a hospital, at day centres or in the community.
- I will be able to get my vaccine too.





Getting my second Covid-19 vaccine

For the vaccine to work you need to have two injections but not on the same day. You have the second between 3-6 weeks later.






Waiting to get my vaccination

Get your vaccination card




Wait 20-30 minutes and all done!



Getting your vaccine

When it is my turn to get my injection, I will go with the nurse. It might be behind a screen or in a booth. It will be quiet. I will have my Communication Card with me. I will be able to share information about me and how I am feeling. It's okay to say if I'm a bit scared. I might have my special person there to support me.

Getting your vaccine

When I get my injection, it's important that I sit as still as I can and keep my hands on my body. I can look at my card to see what is going to happen next. The nurse will wipe my arm with a cool wipe. This cleans my arm. The nurse will put the injection into my arm and then out again. It might feel like a sting or a sharp scratch, but it will be really fast.

The nurse will put a plaster on the spot where the vaccine went in.









After getting your vaccine

After my injection, I need to go back to the waiting room. I have to stay there for 20 minutes. This is really important to make sure that I am okay. I can use my iPad, or listen to music while I wait. The nurse will tell me when I can go home.





After my vaccine, my arm might be a bit sore. I might get a headache or feel a bit tired. That's okay it won't last long. I think my nurse will be really caring. I might want to say Thank you. I might even give a thumbs up or a high five.

In 3-6 weeks, I will need to go back for another vaccine injection. I might feel a bit worried about going back but I know that it is really quick. I will get a card to show that I have had my vaccinations. I will feel really pleased that I have been able to have my injection and keep myself safe.
